If an appointment is made, the person pointed must be a resident of Hill City and can reside in either ward. Common Council would take this action in a motion. a second, discussion, and a vote to appoint someone Mayor. An appointed Mayor would serve out the remaining time of the current mayoral term, which is until July 2024. If a special election is authorized, the winning candidate of a special election also would serve out the remaining time left in the current mayoral term, which again is until July 2024. The Common Council will need to determine which option they would like to choose. All appointments made by the current Mayor would stay in their office until their term ends. Whomever becomes Mayor or has the appropriate mayoral authority can make their own appointments with Common Council concurrence or may remove an appointed officer and report that removal to the Common Council. There are two appointments with their term ending on the first Common Council meeting in July 2023; they are the appointments of the City Attorney and the City Engineer.
